I was grateful for this opportunity to learn about different cultures and be exposed to many challenging situations. 3.5 years ago, we moved back to Adelaide to take up the role in agribusiness with Elders. Personally I have learned so many things through having the courage to develop and practice new skills, listening and acting on feedback, being open to new ideas, different ways of thinking and a love of learning.

Be yourself and you will be happy and successful:

You will have some great ideas about what you want to do now that you have completed your studies and there are probably just as many people telling you that it is a good idea as well as not a good idea! Being yourself and being successful means different things to all of us. You are all successful today, at this point in time, celebrating the achievement of your studies both undergraduate and post graduate. One of the things that I have learned is that you will always be successful doing what you love. Other people may encourage you to do what they love, have courage, learn about yourself and follow your heart. For me it has taken time to learn about myself, what I love and what being myself and being successful means to me. "Being myself" for me is to be of service to others and to do my best to make a positive difference to the world.

One of the best ways I know to help teach others what you have learned is to volunteer in community and sporting activities. Volunteering with an organisation that you are interested in will allow you to put your skills into practice and start getting experience in your field of study.
