Related Classes

Auto Enrol Class

Subject Area and A 4-letter subject area code plus a 4-digit catalogue number make up the course code, e.g. **BIOL 1033**. You can search for courses by using this code.

Class Number A class number is a unique number used to identify individual classes held during a specified study period. You can use class numbers

A class number is a unique number used to identify individual classes held during a specified study period. You can use class numbers to enrol, starting with the class number of the enrolment class.

Enrolment Class

An Enrolment Class is the first class you enrol in for a particular course. This can be a lecture (LEC), tutorial (TUT), workshop (WSH), practical (PRA) or external (EXT). There may be multiple enrolment classes to choose between. All other classes will be related to the enrolment class and will display once you select your enrolment class.

Related classes are other components (i.e. a tutorial or practical) that make up the course. In some cases, you may be automatically enrolled into a particular related class that is associated with the enrolment class you selected.

In some courses, once you select the Enrolment Class, you are automatically enrolled (Auto-Enrol) in a second (related) class (e.g. by choosing a tutorial you are automatically enrolled into the lecture). You may still be required to select another related class to complete

your enrolment.

External Class There is only one enrolment class number you need to enter in 'Manage my Enrolment' when enrolling.

				Midwifery Overview
				Introduction to High Acuity Nursing and Midwifery (Acute Care Midwifery) is designed for the midwife working with woman to develop understanding of co-morbidities and deterioration in a woman's clinical condition during pregnancy. This course supports midwives working in metropolitan, regional and remote areas.
				Focusing on the pregnant woman this stream (class) will use a case-based journey to enable you to critically analyse and discuss four woman who deteriorate during their pregnancies. Following each woman for four weeks, you will explore the deterioration, the clinical manifestations, underlying pathophysiology, to formulate a plan that articulates the interventions required to stabilise the women until help arrives.

	5172	Introduction to High Acuity Nursing and Midwifery		Introduction to High Acuity Nursing and Midwifery (Neonatal) is designed for a registered nurse or midwife working in the neonatal specialty area such as but not limited to neonatal intensive care, special care units and postnatal wards. This stream (class) explores comprehensive assessment and conceptualises neonatal deterioration and response to deterioration. Using a body systems approach, students will critically review the clinical manifestations and underlying pathophysiology of clinical deterioration and propose the interventions and management required to escalate and stabilise.
				Note: Registered nurses or midwives in regional or remote areas who are expected to manage pre-term babies until retrieval support arrives are encouraged to enrol in this course. This is the Neonate class

EXTERNAL STUDENTS

PART TIME STUDENTS

You can study part-time which means undertaking less than the load specified for full time status.
