DEFINITIONS:

Subject Area and Catalogue Number Class Number A 4-letter subject area code plus a 4-digit catalogue number make up the course code, e.g. **BIOL 1033**. You can search for courses by using this code.

A class number is a unique number used to identify individual classes held during a specified study period. You can use class numbers to enrol, starting with the class number of the enrolment class.

Enrolment Class An Enrolment Class is the first class you enrol in for a particular course. This can be a lecture (LEC), tutorial (TUT), workshop (WSH),

practical (PRA) or external (EXT). There may be multiple enrolment classes to choose between. All other classes will be related to the

enrolment class and will display once you select your enrolment class.

Related Classes Related classes are other components (i.e. a tutorial or practical) that make up the course. In some cases, you may be automatically

enrolled into a particular related class that is associated with the enrolment class you selected.

Auto Enrol Class In some courses, once you select the Enrolment Class, you are automatically enrolled (Auto-Enrol) in a second (related) class (e.g. by

choosing a tutorial you are automatically enrolled into the lecture). You may still be required to select another related class to complete

your enrolment.

External Class There is only one enrolment class number you need to enter in 'Manage my Enrolment' when enrolling.

NURS	5172	Introduction to High Acuity Nursing and Midwifery	Please refer to the timetable	NURS 5172 Introduction to High Acuity Nursing and Midwifery has been developed for Registered Nurses and Midwives who seek to enhance their understanding of the processes required to recognise and respond to clinical deterioration in the patient, neonate, or pregnant women in their care. To meet the specific needs of the Registered Nurse or Midwife who enrols in this course four, (4) clinical specialty streams (or classes) have been developed. To ensure that you enrol in the correct stream (class), review the following overview. Only students enrolled in the Graduate Certificate in Nursing (Critical Care) program are allowed to enrol in the Critical Care stream. Students must be working in an intensive care unit (ICU), cardiothoracic ICU, coronary care units or Cath labs.or emergency department (ED). Students will explore and enhance their understanding of recognising and responding to clinical deterioration from the perspective of the critical care nurse. The course focuses on selected aspects of clinical deterioration for both newly admitted and existing patients.		
				The identifying cues for deterioration can be subtle and often go unnoticed. This course assists you to enhance your assessment skills to optimise early detection of clinical deterioration. Students will critically review the clinical manifestations and underlying pathophysiology of clinical deterioration and propose the interventions and management required to escalate and stabilise the deteriorating patient. This course will prepare you for the second course of Critical Care Program (NURS 5118) which enable you to develop more specialist understanding of Intensive Care, Cardiothoracic ICU and Emergency Nursing. - 1. Students enrol in all courses for both study periods (Study Periods 2 & 5) at the beginning of the year
- 2. Students are required to have the support of their Clinical Manager and be working in Emergency, Cardiac or Intensive Care.
- 3. Students working in Regional/Remote centres who wish to complete this program should discuss with the course coordinators before commencing the program.
- 4. NURS 5172 must be completed prior to NURS 5118.
- 5. ICNG students should enrol in classes that are not reserved for SA Health students.

EXTERNAL STUDENTS

Students studying off-campus. Administrative services for external students are located at Campus Central.

PART TIME STUDENTS
