Catalogue Number using
Class Number A class

A 4-letter subject area code plus a 4-digit catalogue number make up the course code, e.g. **BIOL 1033**. You can search for courses by using this code.

A class number is a unique number used to identify individual classes held during a specified study period. You can use class numbers to enrol, starting with the class number of the enrolment class.

Enrolment Class An Enrolment Class is the first class you enrol in for a particular course. This can be a lecture (LEC), tutorial (TUT), workshop (WSH), practical (PRA) or external (EXT). There may be multiple enrolment classes to choose between. All other classes will be related to the

enrolment class and will display once you select your enrolment class.

Related Classes Related classes are other components (i.e. a tutorial or practical) that make up the course. In some cases, you may be automatically

enrolled into a particular related class that is associated with the enrolment class you selected.

Auto Enrol Class In some courses, once you select the Enrolment Class, you are automatically enrolled (Auto-Enrol) in a second (related) class (e.g. by

choosing a tutorial you are automatically enrolled into the lecture). You may still be required to select another related class to complete

your enrolment.

External Class There is only one enrolment class number you need to enter in 'Manage my Enrolment' when enrolling.

To meet the specific needs of the Registered Nurse or Midwife who enrols in this course four, (4) clinical specialty streams (or classes) have been developed. To ensure that you enrol in the correct stream (class), review the following overviews.  Acute Care Overview Introduction to High Acuity Nursing and Midwifery (Acute Care Nursing) is designed for all registered nurses working in any area of healthcare, (except for critical care), including acute medical, surgical, outpatients, aged care, and primary health care. This course assists you to enhance your assessment skills to optimise early detection of clinical deterioration that can occur to any patient in any clinical setting.  Using a body systems approach, students will critically review the clinical manifestations and underlying pathophysiology of clinical deterioration and propose the interventions and management required to escalate and manage the deteriorating patient until help arrives.  Note: It is recommended that RNs working in cardiology enter the acute care stream

# **EXTERNAL STUDENTS**

#### **PART TIME STUDENTS**

You can study part-time which means undertaking less than the load specified for full time status.

(**Full-time load** - The standard annual full-time load is 36 units or 1.0 EFTSL (Equivalent Full-Time Student Load). A student undertaking at least 75% of a full-time load for the academic year will be full-time for that year. A student who is undertaking at least 75% of a full-time load, for either the first half or second half of the year, will be full-time for that half year).
