Subject Area and A 4-letter subject area code plus a 4-digit catalogue number make up the course code, e.g. **BIOL 1033**. You can search for courses by using this code.

Class Number A class number is a unique number used to identify individual classes held during a specified study period. You can use class numbers

A class number is a unique number used to identify individual classes held during a specified study period. You can use class numbers to enrol, starting with the class number of the enrolment class.

An Enrolment Class is the first class you enrol in for a particular course. This can be a lecture (LEC), tutorial (TUT), workshop (WSH), practical (PRA) or external (EXT). There may be multiple enrolment classes to choose between. All other classes will be related to the enrolment class and will display once you select your enrolment class.

Related classes are other components (i.e. a tutorial or practical) that make up the course. In some cases, you may be automatically enrolled into a particular related class that is associated with the enrolment class you selected.

In some courses, once you select the Enrolment Class, you are automatically enrolled (Auto-Enrol) in a second (related) class (e.g. by choosing a tutorial you are automatically enrolled into the lecture). You may still be required to select another related class to complete your enrolment.

There is only one enrolment class number you need to enter in 'Manage my Enrolment' when enrolling.

RULES:

- 1. The course, NURS 5148 Consolidation of Mental Health Nursing Practice, must be taken as the final course in the program.
- 2. Students are required to pass the clinical placement in the course to successfully complete the program.
- 3. Students who are subject to an investigation by the Australian Health Practitioner Regulatory Agency AHPRA under the Health Practitioner Regulation National Law Act cannot proceed with clinical placement until the investigation is completed and the University is notified of the outcome.
- 4. Students must meet the vaccination requirements for health professionals prior to commencing placement. Failure to meet vaccination requirements will limit placement opportunities.
- 5. A current Working with Children Check (WWCC) and a National Police Certificate (NPC) is required prior to commencing placement.
- 6. All students who require clinical placement to be organised by the University must confirm that they meet the "Fitness to Practice in Clinical Placements" requirements prior to clinical placement and as may be required by the Program Director.

NOTES:

- 1. The program is offered only by external delivery. However, all courses have virtual workshops. In some courses these are compulsory unless otherwise negotiated with the Course Coordinator.
- 2. Students are advised to choose NURS 5071 or NURS 5165 or NURS 5164 or NURS 5157 as one of the first courses in the program.
- 3. Students enrol in all courses for both study periods (Study Periods 2 & 5) at the beginning of the year.
- 4. Students with a disability or chronic health condition may be able to have reasonable adjustments made to teaching and learning, assessment, clinical placement, and other activities. Reasonable adjustments should not fundamentally change the nature of the "Fitness to Practice in Clinical Placements" requirements.

An information session will be held for new commencing students – further details to be advised via your student email.

EXTERNAL STUDENTS

Students studying off-campus. Administrative services for external students are located at Campus Central.

External mode includes online, distance education, industry placement or directed research. Virtual classrooms are an external mode of delivery. External mode does not normally include a face to face component, however some courses offered in external mode may require a small component of on-campus activity.

PART TIME STUDENTS

You can study part-time which means undertaking less than the load specified for full time status.

(**Full-time load** - The standard annual full-time load is 36 units or 1.0 EFTSL (Equivalent Full-Time Student Load). A student undertaking at least 75% of a full-time load for the academic year will be full-time for that year. A student who is undertaking at least 75% of a full-time load, for either the first half or second half of the year, will be full-time for that half year).
