A 4-letter subject area code plus a 4-digit catalogue number make up the course code, e.g. **BIOL 1033**. You can search for courses by using this code.

A class number is a unique number used to identify individual classes held during a specified study period. You can use class numbers to enrol, starting with the class number of the enrolment class.

Enrolment Class An Enrolment Class is the first class you enrol in for a particular course. This can be a lecture (LEC), tutorial (TUT), workshop (WSH),

practical (PRA) or external (EXT). There may be multiple enrolment classes to choose between. All other classes will be related to the

enrolment class and will display once you select your enrolment class.

Related Classes Related classes are other components (i.e. a tutorial or practical) that make up the course. In some cases, you may be automatically

enrolled into a particular related class that is associated with the enrolment class you selected.

Auto Enrol Class In some courses, once you select the Enrolment Class, you are automatically enrolled (Auto-Enrol) in a second (related) class (e.g. by

choosing a tutorial you are automatically enrolled into the lecture). You may still be required to select another related class to complete

your enrolment.

External Class There is only one enrolment class number you need to enter in 'Manage my Enrolment' when enrolling.

In Study Period 5 (Semester 2) students can nominate a clinical or research pathway. Students can wait until second year, prior to determining which pathway they will complete.

Students are required to complete 27 or 36 units of unspecified study (dependant on your chosen pathway) from the elective course list below. Please see the individual pathways below for more information.

NURS	5172	Introduction to High Acuity Nursing and Midwifery	Acute Midwifery class 22120 Please refer to the timetable	NURS 5172 Introduction to High Acuity Nursing and Midwifery has been developed for Registered Nurses and Midwives who seek to enhance their understanding of the processes required to recognise and respond to clinical deterioration in the patient, neonate, or pregnant women in their care. To meet the specific needs of the Registered Nurse or Midwife who enrols in this course four, (4) clinical specialty streams (or classes) have been developed. To ensure that you enrol in the correct stream (class), review the following overview. Midwifery Overview Introduction to High Acuity Nursing and Midwifery (Acute Care Midwifery) is designed for the midwife working with woman to develop understanding of co-morbidities and deterioration in a woman's clinical condition during pregnancy. This course supports midwives working in metropolitan, regional and remote areas. Focusing on the pregnant woman this stream (class) will use a case-based journey to enable you to critically analyse and discuss four woman who deteriorate during their pregnancies. Following each woman for four weeks, you will explore the deterioration, the clinical manifestations, underlying pathophysiology, to formulate a plan that articulates the interventions required to stabilise the women until help arrives. - 1. Students may study courses in any order; however, prerequisite requirements may apply.
- 2. Students undertaking a minor thesis of study will be assigned a supervisor and conduct their study by negotiation in accordance with the University's guidelines on research.
- 3. It is preferable that students complete NURS 5157 before NURS 5160.
- 4. Students can only complete NURS 5172 once. Students can select from the Acute Midwifery stream or the Neonatal stream.
- 5. It is preferable that students complete NURS 5153 prior to commencing NURS 5070 or NURS 5003. Students wishing to commence these courses prior to NURS 5153 are advised to contact the Program Director.

EXTERNAL STUDENTS

Students studying off-campus. Administrative services for external students are located at Campus Central.
