Subject Area and  
Catalogue Number  
Class Number

A 4-letter subject area code plus a 4-digit catalogue number make up the course code, e.g. **BIOL 1033**. You can search for courses by using this code.

Enrolment Class

A class number is a unique number used to identify individual classes held during a specified study period. You can use class numbers to enrol, starting with the class number of the enrolment class.

Related Classes

An Enrolment Class is the first class you enrol in for a particular course. This can be a lecture (LEC), tutorial (TUT), workshop (WSH), practical (PRA) or external (EXT). There may be multiple enrolment classes to choose between. All other classes will be related to the enrolment class and will display once you select your enrolment class.

Auto Enrol Class

Related classes are other components (i.e. a tutorial or practical) that make up the course. In some cases you may be automatically enrolled into a particular related class that is associated with the enrolment class you selected.

External Class

In some courses, once you select the Enrolment Class, you are automatically enrolled (Auto-Enrol) in a second (related) class (e.g. by choosing a tutorial you are automatically enrolled into the lecture). You may still be required to select another related class to complete your enrolment.

The external class number will be listed in the Classes column below. This number is the only enrolment class number you need to enter in 'Manage my Enrolment' when enrolling.

**Rules**

1. All students who, as part of their program, undertake activities where interaction with patients/the public is required, such as in field or clinical placements/visits and in University clinics and gyms, must demonstrate that they have a current National Police Certificate (NPC) through SAPOL (or their home state police service) and a current Department of Human Services (DHS) Working With Children Check (WWCC) which is valid for the duration of the program. The National Police Certificate will list disclosable court outcomes that may prevent clinical placement involvement. The University has a process for reviewing these outcomes to assess suitability for placement.
2. Elective is a free elective chosen by the student.

**Notes**

1. Students who have successfully completed a Diploma in Food Technology at TAFE may be granted up to 36 units of credit towards the Bachelor of Nutrition and Food Sciences. Credit applications will be individually assessed by the Program Director.
2. Students can only enrol in either Capstone in Nutrition, Food Sciences or Advanced Capstone in Nutrition and Food Sciences (they cannot enrol in both).
3. Students can choose a free elective from across the university. Students who wish to complete a UniSA Online course as their elective must seek Program Director approval before enrolling.

## PROGRAM NOTES:

### EXTERNAL STUDENTS

Students studying off-campus. Administrative services for external students are located at [Campus Central](#).

**External mode** includes online, distance education, industry placement or directed research. Virtual classrooms are deemed to be an external mode of delivery. External model does not normally include a face to face component, however some courses offered in external mode may require a small component of on-campus activity.

### PART TIME STUDENTS

You can study part-time which means undertaking less than the load specified for full time status.

**(Full-time load** - The standard annual full-time load is 36 units or 1.0 EFTSL (Equivalent Full-Time Student Load). A student undertaking at least 75% of a full-time load for the academic year will be full-time for that year. A student who is undertaking at least 75% of a full-time load, for either the first half or second half of the year, will be full-time for that half year).
